Mandatory Courses, Option Courses and Next Steps







Welcome to Riverside Meadows St Neots Site.

We are an SEMH academy, which means that all our students have an EHCP (Education and Health Care Plan) and an identified need of SEMH (Social Emotional and Mental Health). Many of our students will have other identified needs, and we support them throughout their journey through Year 7 to Year 11, and beyond.

Our aim as an academy is to ensure that all students leave Riverside Meadows with an understanding and qualifications in at least English and Mathematics. We also work with their Social and Emotional needs to ensure that they are able to regulate themselves and be able to access the next stage of their journey, whether that is employment, education or training.

When our students reach the age of 15, usually in Year 9, we begin to look at possible subject options that take into account the students abilities and interests. We call this our "Options" curriculum and it runs alongside compulsory courses of English, Mathematics, Science, PE, PSHE and digital literacy.

Choosing subjects

The transition from Key Stage 3 to Key Stage 4 is a very important time in any student's education, as it gives them the opportunity to choose which subjects and courses to study in Years 10 and 11. Making good decisions now, and for the future, depends on approaching all the options available with an open mind and finding out as much as possible about each subject and possible career interests and opportunities. Some general points to consider are listed below:

- ➤ Choosing certain subjects, or subject combinations, at GCSE could restrict your choices at 16+, whilst other combinations would leave you more choice later.
- ➤ There are 'new' subjects on offer (i.e. ones not studied at Key Stage 3). Choosing a new subject just because it is new may not be the right choice if you know you are doing well in a subject already it may be better to stay with it.
- > Choosing a new subject may be right for you it could give you a fresh start that might benefit you.
- > Try to talk to students, particularly in Year 10, who are currently studying GCSE subjects. They will be able to tell you a lot about the subject from a student's point of view.
- > Do not choose a subject because your friends have chosen it work to your strengths not theirs!
- > Choose what you are interested in and what you have done well in so far.
- > Base your choice on facts not emotions.

Options lessons are taken over three blocks for two hours each week. There is also opportunity for catch-up lessons built into the timetable should the options block clash with specific interventions and therapies. It is expected that students will study one different option from each block.

Career considerations

It is not essential to have a particular career in mind at this stage - some students do and some do not. You may wish to discuss with the relevant staff what careers particular choices might lead you into in the future. If, however, you do have a career area in mind, it would be worth consulting with your tutor or the Careers Adviser to check that your choices do not make it difficult to follow that career pathway in the future.




